

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# Report of the Governing Body of the National Institute of Public Finance and Policy for the year 1985-86

# Overview

The year 1985–86 has been of special significance for the Institute as by the end of the year the Institute was about to complete the first decade of its activities. While the Institute has grown steadily in these ten years to establish itself as the leading academic institution in the field of public finance in the country, with over fifty completed studies to its credit,—some, pioneering in their area—the concluding year of the first decade itself was eventful in many ways. Notable developments during the year under review include a change of Directors, strengthening of the professional ranks, a marked step-up in academic activities in terms of projects completed or nearing completion, seminars, symposia and working papers, as well as expansion of its training programmes to include mainstream courses for senior officials of the Indian Administrative Service, and initiation of research in new directions.

The Institute was able to complete two State-sponsored projects and the concluding section of a three-part study commissioned by Delhi Administration in 1983. (These studies are described later.) It could be said that the keynote of the academic activities in the year under review was provided by the now celebrated study on the underground or black economy, "Aspects of the Black Economy in India", which brought the Institute to the forefront of a prolonged public debate in the country, culminating in a lively symposium on the subject, organised by the Institute. This provided an opportunity for close interaction of the Institute with leading academicians and scholars in public finance as also "opinion makers" and monitors of the financial world. Continuing this interaction with the outside world, as it were, the Institute held as many as 23 seminars and lecture-discussions during the year, and also organised jointly with the Indian Statistical Institute, New Delhi, the Annual Conference of the Indian Association of Research in National Income and Wealth (IARNIW) in November 1985.

The Academic and Research Programmes Committee, consisting of the senior academic staff, continued to meet periodically to review, evaluate and assess the progress of projects undertaken by the Institute. A system of quarterly progress reports by the academic staff has facilitated the effective functioning of the Committee. Other committees entrusted with the task of overseeing important aspects of the Institute's administration rendered valuable help in the management of the Institute's library, the computer unit, the canteen and the tenders.

In view of the need to settle the grievances which surface from time to time among the staff in a growing organisation, a Staff Council was formed during the year. Adequate representation was given to both professional and non-professional staff. In the course of its meetings during the year, the Council dealt with several issues pertaining to staff welfare in general as also individual cases.

The Institute had the first change of its Director during the year. Its founding member and first Director, Dr. Raja J. Chelliah, was appointed Member of the Planning Commission, Government of India, in January 1985. Thereupon, at the instance of the Governing Body, Dr. Amaresh Bagchi, Officer on Special Duty, Ministry of Finance, Government of India, was approached with the offer of Directorship of the Institute. Dr. Bagchi accepted the offer subject to his release from the Ministry of Finance. Dr. Chelliah was requested to continue as Honorary Director till Dr. Bagchi was in a position to take over as Director. As Dr. Chelliah had to go to Zimbabwe at the end of March 1985, Dr. Bagchi took over as Honorary Director on April 1, 1985, and thereafter as full-time Director from July 1, 1985.

Dr. Bagchi's association with the Institute dates from June 1980 when he had joined as Senior Fellow and RBI Professor. He had returned to the Ministry of Finance in December 1983. After his appointment as Director, Dr. Bagchi has continued to work as Honorary Consultant to the Ministry of Finance in addition to discharging his responsibilities at the Institute.

As of March 31, 1986, the Institute had on its rolls 30 professional staff members, including the Director. The list of Faculty members and other senior staff members is given in Annexure I. As in the past, in accordance with the varying requirements of different research projects, the Institute recruited several new incumbents at both senior and middle levels. Dr. Sudipto Mundle joined the Institute as Senior Fellow and RBI Professor in May 1985. Dr. Mahesh C. Purohit, who had proceeded to Nigeria on a leave assignment in December 1982, returned to the Institute as Senior Fellow in April 1985. Other professional staff recruited during the year include three Consultants, a Senior Economist and two Economists. In addition there were Research Assistants and temporary Research Investigators working on various projects.

- Dr. M. Govinda Rao was promoted as Senior Fellow during the year, while Dr. Srinivisa Madhur was promoted as Fellow and Dr. Tapas Sen as Senior Economist.
- Mr. K. Srinivasan, former Member, Central Board of Direct Taxes, continued to work with us as Senior Consultant. Dr. T.R. Talwar and Dr. N.K. Tandon, both ICSSR Fellows, and Dr. B. Nimbur and Mr. S. Pawamani, Consultants, left the Institute on expiry of their tenure.

During the year, the Director and professional staff members engaged themselves fully in academic and research work in the Institute and also in various assignments, seminars and lectures, both in India and abroad.

- Dr. Bagchi, Director, visited Nigeria in November 1985 as Consultant to the World Bank, where he submitted a paper on State Finances in Nigeria. He also went to Manila in December 1985 as Consultant to the Asian Development Bank (ADB) to prepare an Issues Paper for a study on Financing Public Sector Development Expenditure. The study has been initiated by the ADB and covers seven of its developing member countries including India. During the year, Dr. Bagchi prepared a paper also for the Commission of Inquiry into Taxation, Government of Zimbabwe, headed by Dr. Chelliah, and another for the ESCAP.
- Dr. Bagchi also visited, among other institutions, the Lal Bahadur Shastri National Academy of Administration, Mussoorie, where he spoke to the staff and senior IAS officers on Resource Mobilisation: Fiscal, Monetary and Pricing Policies; and the Bengal Chamber of Commerce, Calcutta, where he addressed a seminar organised by the Chamber on Tax Reform.
- Dr. Bagchi also participated as a Member of the Indian delegation in an Indo-Soviet colloquium on Planning held under the auspices of the Planning Commission in October 1985. In January 1986, Dr. Bagchi along with Dr. M. Govinda Rao, Senior Fellow, took part in an Indo-French seminar on the role of Public Enterprises organised by the Planning Commission and the Bureau of Public Enterprises as part of Festival of India programmes.
- Dr. Vinay D. Lall, Senior Fellow, who has been on leave since September 1984, was granted a six-month extension of leave with the approval of the Governing Body. He continued to work as Director, Society for Development Studies, in which capacity he was associated with the Institute on a project pertaining to Provident Funds.
- Dr. K.N. Reddy, Senior Fellow, continued to be in charge of a number of training programmes of the Institute in 1985-86. He was assigned the responsibility for conducting two inaugural courses for IAS officers, in addition to the courses initiated in 1984-85. Reactions of the participants were very positive, which is a matter for satisfaction to the Institute. Dr. Reddy also participated in a seminar on International Competitiveness organised by the Association of Indian Engineering Industries held in New Delhi, in April 1985.

- Dr. Mahesh C. Purohit, Senior Fellow, addressed the probationers of the Indian Statistical Service under the auspices of the Central Statistical Organisation, Government of India, and the staff and students of the Department of Economics, University of Rajasthan, Jaipur.
- Dr. Sudipto Mundle, Senior Fellow, visited Istanbul in September 1985 to present a paper at the North-South Round Table. He also lectured at various institutions and attended several seminars in India.
- Dr. M. Govinda Rao, Senior Fellow, along with Dr. Bagchi, Director, participated in the Indo-French. Seminar on Role of the Public Sector in January 1986, where he presented a paper jointly with Dr. Bagchi. Dr. Rao also conducted a symposium on Sales Tax System in India for the Commissioners of Sales Tax of several States at the Institute in August 1985.
- Mr. K. Srinivasan, Senior Consultant, participated in the 18th All India Conference of Corporate Managers organised by the Federation of Indian Chambers of Commerce and Industry and addressed Commissioners of Income Tax in a programme organised by the Administrative Staff College, Hyderabad. He also attended two Workshops: on Corporate Philanthropy sponsored by the Centre for Policy Research and Ford Foundation, where he presented a paper, and another on Housing, organised by the Ministry of Works and Housing (now redesignated Ministry of Urban Development) and the Indian Institute of Public Administration.
- Dr. Shyam Nath, Fellow, conducted the Workshop in Urban Finance at the Institute in May 1985 and also organised the two Advanced Training Courses in Sales Tax Administration in May and December 1985.
- Mr. K.N. Balasubramanian, Senior Consultant, was in Zimbabwe from November 1985 to February 1986 as Consultant to the Commission of Inquiry into Taxation for which he prepared a detailed report on Income Tax and Sales Tax Administration in Zimbabwe.

Dr. Srinivasa Madhur, Fellow, visited the University of Warwick, UK, in November 1985, in connection with a research project on Computation of Effective Rates of Indirect Taxes. He also attended the 14th Regional Seminar on Interlinked Country Models, organised by the United Nations Economic and Social Council for Asia and the Pacific (UN-ESCAP) at Bangkok, Thailand, in November 1985. He visited Tokyo in March 1986 as a Consultant to the Institute for Developing Economies, on a project on Business Cycles Indicators in Asia. He also co-authored two papers presented at seminars held under the auspices of the Ministry of Finance, Government of India, in July 1985 and January 1986.

Dr. Arindam Das-Gupta, Senior Consultant, wrote and also co-authored background notes and a bibliography for the Committee on Progressive Expenditure Taxation, chaired by Dr. Chelliah. Dr. Das-Gupta was also a discussant for two papers at the Conference on Economic Theory and Related Mathematical Models, organised by the Indian Statistical Institute, New Delhi, in March 1986.

As a measure of faculty improvement, the Institute has been sponsoring its staff for training at universities in the USA under the Ford Foundation Grant for research and training in Public Finance. As indicated in the Institute's Annual Report for 1984-85, under this programme, Dr. Tapas K. Sen and Mr. S. Gopalakrishna, Economists, had gone to the University of Maryland and the University of Wisconsin, respectively. After a nine-month stay, they returned to the Institute in June 1985. Mr. Gopalakrishna wrote a paper jointly with Professor Martin David of the Department of Economics, University of Wisconsin, on Incentive Effects of Capital Gains and Inheritance Taxes on Inter-State Migration: The Holt and Shelton Analysis Revisited.

Dr. Tapas K. Sen was a Visiting Fellow at the Shivaji University, Kolhapur, in December 1985. He delivered thirteen lectures on various topics to the M.A. and M. Phil. students of the University and one lecture on Inflation Accounting to the staff and students of Chhatrapati Shahu Institute for Research in Rural Management, Kolhapur.

Under the Ford Foundation programme, Mr. A.V.L. Narayana, Economist, left for the University of Maryland in September 1985.

Mr. V.B. Tulsidhar, Economist, participated in the 20th Anniversary International Conference of the Inpur-Output Research Association, held at the North Eastern Hill University Campus, Shillong. He presented two papers at the Conference.

As in past years, several senior staff members served on committees set up by the Central and State Governments.

- Dr. A. Bagchi, Director, served as Member, study Group on Taxation of Expenditure, set up by the Ministry of Finance, Government of India, and headed by Dr. R.J. Chelliah. He was also Member, Research Advisory Committee, Planning Commission, and Chairman of the Sub-Group on Data Gaps in Public Finance set up by the Planning Commission.
- Mr. K. Srinivasan, Senior Consultant, continued to serve as Member, Taxation Sub-Committee of the FICCI.
- Dr. M. Govinda Rao, Senior Fellow, served as Member, Uttar Pradesh Resource Mobilisation and Taxation Review Committee, Government of Uttar Pradesh, and as Member, Working Group on Financial Policy Issues for Sustained Growth with Reasonable Price Stability, Planning Commission, Government of India.

# Research Activities and Consultancy Work

The Central Government, State Governments and international agencies continued to entrust the Institute with research projects of considerable importance. The year under review, as mentioned earlier, saw the completion of two projects and the concluding part of another. However, work on several new projects was initiated and the progress of on-going projects was accelerated in order to complete them within their deadlines, and also to clear the backlog of incomplete projects.

# (a) Projects completed or nearing completion

The two major projects completed during the year were: (i) Alternatives to Octroi in Rajasthan, the report on which was submitted to the Government of Rajasthan in September 1985, and (ii) Study on Sales Taxation in Madhya Pradesh, submitted to the Government of Madhya Pradesh in March 1986.

It may be recalled that the project entrusted to the Institute by Delhi Administration in 1983 comprised a comprehensive study of the three major levies in the Union Territory of Delhi, namely, Sales Tax, Property Tax and Terminal Tax. While the reports pertaining to the first two levies were submitted to the sponsors in 1984, the third project, on Terminal Tax, had been delayed due to unforeseen circumstances, mainly the sudden demise of the project leader (Dr. V.G. Rao) in December 1984. Work was reallocated subsequently and concerted efforts were made to complete the project as expeditiously as possible. After a final revision by the Director, the report, titled "Study on Terminal Tax in Delhi", was submitted to Delhi Administration in April 1986.

Three major studies were nearing completion by the end of the year 1985-86. The one commissioned by the Ministry of Finance, Government of India, is the first of a four-part study comprising in-depth reviews of the following incentives provided by the Income-tax Act, 1961: (i) Section 35CC: Expenditure on Rural Development incurred by Companies and Cooperative Societies; (ii) Section 32A: Investment Allowance; (iii) Section 80HH: Incentives for setting up Industries in Backward Areas, also known as Backward Area Allowance, and (iv) Section 80I: Tax Holiday in respect of profits of New Industrial Undertakings. The report on the first part, that is, Section 35CC, is expected to be submitted to the Ministry by June-July 1986\*

The other study which was nearing completion, during the year under review is Stamps and Registration Duties in West Bengal, sponsored by the Government of West Bengal\*.

An attempt was also being made to complete the study on Provident Funds\* commissioned by the Provident Funds Commissioner. The study had been entrusted to Dr. Vinay D. Lall, Senior Fellow (on leave) and Director, Society for Development Studies, New Delhi.

Two other projects nearing completion are Computation of Effective Indirect Tax Rates for India and Drafting of Model Law to give effect to the 46th Amendment to the Constitution of India.

# (b) Projects in progress and new projects

The following projects are currently in progress: (i) Fiscal Policy for the National Capital Region; (ii) Study of Sales Tax System in Manipur; (iii) Comparative Study of State Government Expenditures, sponsored by a number of State Governments; (iv) Financing Public Sector Development Expenditure, sponsored by the Asian Development Bank; (v) Budgetary Policies in India and (vi) Inter-Sectoral Linkages in Development, both sponsored by the ICSSR; (vii) Management of Finances of Kerala State during the Sixth Plan Period, being conducted jointly with the Planning Commission; (viii) Property Tax Reform in West Bengal (revision and updating); (ix) Determinants of Share Values and (x) Study of Employees Welfare Funds, both projects sponsored by the Institute.

The Institute will be taking up shortly an ambitious three-year programme of studies on Industrial Policy in India. The Ford Foundation is likely to extend support for this programme. Government's approval to the grant is awaited.

The Union Finance Minister in his Long Term Fiscal Policy Statement had mentioned that the NIPFP will be asked to carry out studies on the incidence of excise duties and import duties periodically. A project proposal drawn up in consultation with the Ministry of Finance was submitted to Government and the study has since commenced.

The Planning Commission is going to provide a block grant to help build up a data bank on public finances in India. The Institute will undertake specific studies in State finances as desired by the Commission as part of the programmes to be supported under the grant.

It may be mentioned that the Institute is also providing support for academic studies to assist the Committee on Expenditure Tax set up by the Ministry of Finance.

Projects completed or nearing completion, those in progress and also projects that are proposed to be taken up shortly, are listed in Annexure II.

# **Training Programmes**

The core of the Institute's well-established training programmes are the two Advanced Training Courses in Sales Tax Administration conducted in May and November-December each year. These courses were held in this reporting year too, with all indications that they will continue to grow in attendance and popularity.

As mentioned earlier, the Institute has now come into the mainstream of Government-sponsored nation-wide training activities related to both functional and result-oriented aspects of public administration. Two courses, one on Fiscal Analysis and Budgetary Planning and the other on Introduction to Economic Analysis and Policy, were held for the benefit of senior and middle-level officers of the Central and State Governments.

in July-August 1985 and November 1985, respectively. It may be mentioned that the latter course had been introduced in December 1984 under the sponsorship of the Department of Personnel and Training, Government of India.

The Institute also conducted two one-week courses in Policy Planning and Analysis related to Wages, Incomes and Prices, for senior IAS officers, in December 1985 and February 1986.

It is gratifying to record that in all the courses, close cooperation between the Institute's administrative and professional staff members contributed in great measure to their success. It needs also to be mentioned that the participants' interest in the activities of the Institute, that is, other than its training functions, has been a source of considerable satisfaction for all members of the staff.

# Visiting Professors and Scholars

The year 1985-86 saw a marked step-up in the seminars held at the Institute: as many as 23, in contrast to the seven or eight on an average in the past years. These seminars were in addition to the largely attended symposium on Black Money held in the wake of the Report on Aspects of the Black Money submitted to the Government of India, Ministry of Finance, in March 1985.

A number of eminent scholars, professional economists and others were invited to the Institute for seminars and lecture-discussions. Among them were, (i) Professor John F. Due of the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, USA, who spoke on Problems and Issues in Indirect Taxation in Developing Countries; (ii) Professor M.K. Rakshit, UGC Professor and Faculty Member, Presidency College, Calcutta, who discussed Monetary Policy with special reference to New Thrusts in Fiscal Policy, and (iii) Professor Mukul Asher of the National University of Singapore, who addressed the Institute's staff on two subjects: Fiscal Policy Dilemmas facing ASEAN and Tax Reform in Indonesia: A Preliminary Assessment.

During his stay at the Institute Prof. Mihir Rakshit wrote a paper, "A Primer on Budgetary Policy or, How to get rid of Money Illusion". This was subsequently issued as a Working Paper of the Institute.

A paper on Excise and Sales Taxation in India written by Prof. Due on his return to the USA, was also issued as a Working Paper of the Institute.

Some senior faculty members of the Institute too conducted seminars during the year on the basis of their work. A list of speakers and the topics of their seminars is presented in Annexure III.

## Library

The Institute's Library is now ready for a big expansion, made possible by a large grant from the Ministry of Finance sanctioned during the year. A sum of Rs. 1 lakh was released out of this during 1985-86. This will be followed by a grant of Rs. 3 lakh in 1986-87 to enable the Library to acquire all useful publications including periodicals in the field of public finance, especially areas like tax systems of other countries and transnational tax treaties.

During the year, nearly 1,500 volumes of books, reports and other publications were procured and added to the stock. Complete sets of Census of India reports for 1971 and a good number of 1981 reports were also procured during this period. Several old NSS reports were also acquired. By now the total holdings of such publication and bound periodicals etc amount to over 9500 volumes. A large number of new journals, both Indian and foreign, were subscribed and as of now 174 periodicals including loose-leaf serials are being received in the Library. The entire list of such periodicals is contained in Annexure IV.

In addition, a programme of exchange of reports, working papers, reprints and mimeographs with other reputed institutions, both in India as well as abroad has been reorganised under the supervision of two of the senior staff members.

As in the past, several research scholars from various universities and institutions visited the Institute's Library in connection with their research work in the area of public finance.

# Computer Centre

There was no further addition to the computer hardware during the year. Efforts were directed towards developing new software for general application and analysis of data for specific projects. It is proposed to replace the present computer system with a more advanced system to facilitate the building up of a Data Bank on Public Finance with the assistance of the Planning Commission.

Efforts were made to fully utilise the word processing facility. As a first step, the Report on Sales Tax in Madhya Pradesh was finally prepared on the Work Horse. However, in the absence of print-out facilities in the Computer Unit, printing has to be entrusted to some commercial agencies. It is hoped that a printer facility will also be acquired in the near future.

Lectures in electronic data processing were delivered during the Institute's training programmes. Practical demonstrations on computerisation of data were also organised for the participants of the programmes.

Shri K.R. Subramanian of the Computer Unit was deputed for participation in the customer training programme organised by the Hindustan Computers Ltd.

# Lectures by Staff Members

Several of our staff members are invited by various professional and research institutes of repute and universities, to lecture on different aspects of economics, in general, and on public finance and related subjects, in particular. During the year under review, the Director and other staff members lectured at, among others, Lal Bahadur Shastri National Academy of Administration, Management Development Institute, Gurgaon; Office of the Comptroller and Auditor General, New Delhi; Andhra University, Waltair; Administrative Staff College of India, Hyderabad; University of Rajasthan, Jaipur; Centre for Development Studies, Trivandrum, and Municipal Corporation of Delhi. This was in addition to the lectures that staff members are invited to give at the various training programmes of the Institute.

# Institute's Publications

# (a) Publications

Towards the end of the year, the Institute published in one volume the three reports which had been prepared for the Central Board of Excise and Customs during 1982-84. The title of this volume is Evasion of Excise Duties in India: Studies of Copper, Plastics and Cotton Textile Fabrics. The Institute's publications are listed in Annexure VI.

# (b) Papers by staff members

Several of the Institute's staff were actively associated with various conferences and seminars for which they prepared papers on a number of subjects. They also published articles in reputed journals and newspapers, and wrote Working Papers which were issued during the year. Details of these papers and articles are at Annexure VII.

# Corporate Membership

As on March 31, 1986, the Institute had 15 sponsoring corporate members, six permanent members and 12 ordinary corporate members. During the year, Canara Bank joined as an ordinary corporate member and Delhi Administration dropped out from its membership. The list of members is contained in Annexure VIII.

# Composition of the Governing Body

The list of members of the Governing Body as on March 31, 1986, is given at Annexure IX.

# Institute's Building Complex

The Institute's request for sanction of a capital grant for construction of residential quarters is still being processed by the Integrated Finance Unit of the Department of Revenue, Ministry of Finance. As soon as budget provision is made and the funds are released, the Institute will be able to start construction of the residential quarters.

## Grant from the Government of India

The Institute received a grant of Rs. 10.00 lakh from the Government of India for meeting its recurring expenditure and Rs. 1.77 lakh for meeting the additional cost resulting from rise in dearness allowance payable to the core staff. In addition, the Government of India, Ministry of Finance, also agreed to sanction a substantial special grant amounting to Rs. 10.00 lakh for strengthening the Institute's library in order that the Institute can serve as the premier reference library on public finance for researchers in India working in this field. A sum of Rs. 1.00 lakh was made available during the year on this account and the Government has agreed to provide a sum of Rs. 3.00 lakh each for the next three years.

# Ford Foundation Supplementary Grant

Supplementary Grant amounting to US \$ 2,45,000 sanctioned by the Ford Foundation for development support for a period of three years commencing September 12, 1980, was extended till December, 1985, and since the full amount of the grant could not be utilised till December 1985, the Ford Foundation acceded to our request for a further extension of period of grant till the end of June, 1986.

Out of the total supplementary grant of US \$2,45,000, the Institute has utilised US \$2,39,602 upto 31st March, 1986 and will be utilising the balance by the end of June, 1986. Details of expenses met out of the Ford Foundation Grant are given in Schedule 'G' attached to the Accounts.
